During the UN Conference on Climate Change (COP 27) in Sharm-el Sheikh, Egypt in December '22, If Not Us Then Who - in collaboration with the Global Alliance of Territorial Communities (GATC), the Tenure Facility, and other partners - hosted a series of events and large scale projection mapping installations to amplify indigenous voices, art, music, film, conversations, and demands - highlighting the importance of Indigenous leadership, traditional knowledge, territorial sovereignty and land rights in the protection of the world's biodiversity and ecological wellbeing.

We host these experiences as part of 'Our Village'- experiential gatherings where communities, activists, artists, and leaders connect to amplify ideas and generate inclusive spaces for dialogue, with the shared vision of healing our planet.

## OUR VILLAGE COMMUNITY CORNER AT THE GREEN ZONE

In partnership with Global Alliance of Territorial Communities (GATC), Black & Indigenous Liberation Movement (BILM), What Design Can Do, and Creative Industries Fund NL, we hosted an Our Village Community Corner in the Green Zone, supported by the Tenure Facility. The space was host to a diverse range of talks and screenings during the conference. Approximately 185 people visited the community corner.







# COP27 COMMUNITY BASED VIDEO PRODUCTION:

In partnership with the GATC we commissioned 5 community-based filmmakers to produce short videos around the 5 demands, highlighting in-territory community action and on-the-ground realities to send to COP27.


