In 2023, our organization experienced significant growth and progress in our training initiatives, thanks to increased funding and support for our Mentorship and Residency programs.

A notable addition to these programs was the introduction of the 'Indigenous Imaginarium', an annual flagship event aimed at promoting indigenous storytelling in Hollywood and expanding our global impact networks.

This initiative not only reframed indigenous storytellers as key contributors to broadening our climate imagination but also facilitated valuable connections between local communicators and industry professionals, fostering collaboration and continued success.

Additionally, we remain dedicated to actively supporting Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities in participating in decision-making processes at climate conferences, furthering our commitment to inclusivity and diversity by supporting Indigenous and local community climate solutions.

Internally, we invested in enhancing our systems and processes, including the establishment of an impact producers department and improvements to our impact reports. We also implemented new systems to empower our diverse team in collective decision-making and initiated strategic meetings to develop a collaborative long-term strategy.

Moreover, we have begun working on diversifying our funding sources while improving our financial systems, ensuring sustainability and growth.

This comprehensive effort is pivotal in empowering our diverse team of climate storytellers and reflects our commitment to creating a workplace that mirrors the positive change we want to see in the world, If Not Us Then Who?

EMERGING FILMMAKERS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT



The Emerging Filmmakers Professional Development Programme is a multi-year, intermediate-level mentorship program consisting of personalized 1-2-1 mentorship sessions and a masterclass series with invited filmmakers and filmmaking industry professionals. The objective is to increase the professional capacity and networks of the program participants, as well as their distribution opportunities. Mentees develop a set of professional development objectives for the year and work with their mentor toward achieving them.

This year, we had 23 active mentees and a total of 8 films were finalized along with a personalised impact and distribution plan for each film. In addition, we supported applications for funds, awards, grants and film screening opportunities for active and former mentees.

CLIMATE JUSTICE BUS TOUR

In partnership with the Hoopbus, the Hip Hop Caucus, Friends of the Earth, the National Wildlife Federation, the Center for Cultural Power, the Global Alliance of Territorial Communities, the Rainforest Action Network, and more, INUTW mobilized a Climate Action bus tour through the streets of Manhattan to engage thousands of NY citizens in messages of climate and racial justice. As a key call to action, we held a rally bringing press and partners to the NY Governor's office to hand deliver 600,000+ signatures demanding that the Governor sign the NY State Deforestation Free Procurement bill, as well as to support Indigenous and Black communities in their fight for racial and climate justice.





























2-DAY OUR VILLAGE AT HELEN MILLS THEATRE

Our Village NYCW '23 programming featured dynamic spaces for networking, showcasing Indigenous and Black artists, and featuring Indigenous musical guests - while also hosting inspiring and informative panels and discussions, screenings of films made by Indigenous and Black storytellers, and presentations sharing solutions, strategies, and calls to action from Indigenous and Black leaders and activists in the climate space. We featured over 60 presenters with a total of 600 attendees over our 2 days of programming in collaboration with 23 partnering organizations.

MARAKÁ MUSIC SHOWCASE

During Our Village NYCW23, INUTW partnered with Maraká Music to host an Indigenous musical and audiovisual show. The evening featured eight Brazilian and South American Indigenous artists who combined traditional and electronic music to convey the fight of their communities. The night opened with a political statement from Brazilian Indigenous leaders highlighting essential messages that cultural resilience is territorial resilience.

Throughout 2023, photography has remained a powerful tool for INUTW and the Indigenous photographic storytellers we work alongside. We have worked closely with creatives, helping to develop their practices and find outlets for their emotive, thoughtful, and impactful projects through editorials, collaborations with publishers, exhibitions, assigning work through our image library, as well as creating our first Zine (A small circulation of self-published printed work with original texts and images).

We hope to continue to empower Indigenous photographic storytellers still further in 2024 as we roll out further editions of our Zine and seek to strengthen the already wonderful collaborations we have built in 2023.


LAUNCHING THE ZINE








ECHOES OF THE EARTH PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBITION AT COP28

The photographic exhibition represents the five organizations that are part of the GATC: the Indonesian Alliance of Indigenous Peoples of the Archipelago (AMAN); the Mesoamerican Alliance of Peoples and Forests (AMPB); the Articulation of Indigenous Peoples of Brazil (APIB); the Coordinator of Indigenous Communities of the Amazon Basin; and the Network of Indigenous and Local Populations for the Sustainable Management of Central African Forest Ecosystems (REPALEAC).

In collaboration with CAN Europe, we focused on creating 'Climate Solutions' films to articulate tangible solutions and share positive messages that inspire viewers to take action.

AMPLIFICATION

SEEKING JUSTICE FOR SAWETO

In August 2014, tragedy struck when four Indigenous Asheninka environmental defenders were brutally murdered in the forests near their community of Saweto, in the Peruvian Amazon. Nearly a decade after, the widows of the murdered environmental defenders continue their quest for justice.

In solidarity with these widows, we have supported the "Justice for Saweto" campaign with visuals and amplification opportunities, highlighting the current struggle and calling for accountability.

We released a teaser used at a live session with judges and provided a platform in our main programming at 'Our Village,' our community event held during NYCW in September 2023, amplifying the cause and facilitating connections with other NGOs who could provide support.


FRIENDS OF THE EARTH CAMPAIGN

STOP FUNDING CLIMATE DESTRUCTION

We partnered with Friends of the Earth's <u>Stop Funding Climate</u> <u>Destruction New York</u> campaign to push for the signing of The New York Tropical Deforestation-Free Procurement Act (S.4859 /A.5682).

PARTNERING FOR CAMPAIGN AMPLIFICATION

RAISING AWARENESS

NATURE IN ACTION SERIES

For the second year in a row, we supported The Nature Conservancy's Nature4Climate (N4C) team by providing strategic communications support to promote community-led nature-based solutions worldwide.

This involved producing 3 short documentaries showcasing real-world examples of 'Nature in Action'. These documentaries were strategically launched during NYCW and COP28 to promote the importance high-integrity nature-based projects and support the launch of their <u>NatureBase platform</u>.













IMPACT AND DISTRIBUTION OF OUR FILMS

In 2023, our efforts to share impactful stories through strategic distribution saw significant growth. Organizing over 60 film screenings at festivals, events, activations, and educational initiatives, we expanded our reach to diverse audiences across Colombia, the USA, Brazil, Mexico, and Canada. These screenings provided inclusive platforms, allowing Indigenous and local communities, activists, environmental leaders, educators and students to amplify their stories.






FINANCIAL SUMMARY
